(for this fee you gain entry to the whole Museum on the day)



Did you know that when European settlers first came to the River Derwent, there were so many whales that one man thought he could almost walk across the river on their backs! Have you ever wondered what was so special about whales that *they were hunted almost to extinction* 150 years ago? Some merchants and ships captains literally made their fortunes from the whaling industry. At one time there were *over 30 whaling ships* working out of Hobart. But, it was a dirty, smelly and disgusting business.

So, we will take you back in time to learn about the history of whaling in and around early Hobart. We will have some great *smelly* stories to tell about life on a whaling ship.

Then we will head off to the docks where you are going to make a whale. Yes, that's right (well, not a real one, but it's going to be **BIG**). And we are going to learn about *whale conservation* and what we can all do to ensure these great mammals keep coming back to Tasmanian waters.
